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Co-sponsors Sought for ACE Kids Act; HOPD Advocacy Continues



Paul King, executive director, University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and Von Voigtlander Women's Hospital, Ann Arbor, took a lead role in discussing the ACE Kids Act in Washington, DC, last week.

Last week, the MHA partnered with the Children's Hospital Association to visit Capitol Hill and ask members of Michigan's congressional delegation to co-sponsor H.R. 546 and S. 298, the Advancing Care for Exceptional (ACE) Kids Act.

Under the ACE Kids Act, states could authorize a provider — such as a pediatrician or pediatric specialist, a children's hospital or community health center — or a team of healthcare professionals to provide comprehensive care management and care coordination services for eligible children with medically complex conditions. This would include coordinating access to medical services from out-of-state healthcare providers as medically necessary. As a condition of participating in the health home option, which would allow specialty children's healthcare providers to manage care for severely ill children, states would be required to collect data on the characteristics of participating children and providers, as well as applicable quality-of-care measures.

Chronically ill and medically fragile children represent only 6 percent of patients at children's hospitals, but account for 40 percent of the total amount billed for patient care at those same hospitals. Clinically intensive care coordination, as proposed under the legislation, is expected to

save money for the Medicaid program.

Paul King, executive director at the University of Michigan's C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and Von Voigtlander Women's Hospital, Ann Arbor, represented Michigan children's hospitals during visits with Michigan House members and the office of Sen. Debbie Stabenow. Sponsors of the ACE Kids Act are working for the act's inclusion in a year-end legislative vehicle.

Also last week, MHA members encouraged members of the Michigan congressional delegation to co-sign <u>U.S. House and Senate letters</u> to Andy Slavitt, acting administrator for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, regarding the proposed rule for implementing Section 603 of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2015. As proposed, **this rule would impede innovation and the redesign of hospital care delivery by prohibiting reimbursement for hospital outpatient department (HOPD) services that were relocated after Nov. 2, 2015, and for any new outpatient services offered after Nov. 2.**

The rule also deems off-campus HOPDs that opened or changed service lines or locations since Nov. 2 to be physicianowned clinics for reimbursement purposes, but not for operational purposes. This provision would set up substantial compliance risk under federal fraud and abuse law. Michigan's U.S. Sens. Debbie Stabenow and Gary Peters signed the Senate letter, and more than half of the Michigan House members signed the House letter. Advocacy on the HOPD issue continues this month and is expected to extend into Congress' lame-duck session in December. 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MHA Keystone Center Awarded HIIN Contract; Partners with IHA, WHA

The MHA Keystone Center has been awarded a two-year Hospital Improvement Innovation Network (HIIN) contract by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), with the option for a third year based on early performance. As part of the HIIN contract, the MHA Keystone Center has partnered with the Illinois Health and Hospital Association (IHA) and the Wisconsin Hospital Association (WHA) in launching the Great Lakes Partners for Patients, a multistate effort that will give participating hospitals the opportunity to share solutions that have been successful in rural, urban and suburban communities.

The partnership's goal is to reduce hospital-acquired conditions by 20 percent and readmissions by 12 percent by building on the quality improvement work of the MHA, IHA and WHA through the CMS's national Partnership for Patients Hospital Engagement Network (HEN) 1.0 and 2.0, contracts awarded from 2011 to 2015. Participating hospitals will receive the necessary tools to continue implementing innovations necessary to achieve goals to prevent harm, save lives and lower healthcare costs.

Over the next three years, Great Lakes Partners for Patients hospitals will focus on implementing person and family engagement practices, enhance antimicrobial stewardship, build high-reliability cultures, and address 11 types of inpatient harm:

- · Adverse drug events
- · Central-line-associated bloodstream infections
- · Catheter-associated urinary tract infections
- · Clostridium difficile bacterial infection, including antibiotic stewardship
- · Injury from falls and immobility
- · Pressure ulcers
- · Sepsis and septic shock
- · Surgical-site infections
- Venous thromboembolism
- · Ventilator-associated events
- Readmissions

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Valuable Monthly Financial Survey Functions Outlined in Webinar



Earlier this year, the MHA Board of Trustees <u>endorsed</u> participation by all Michigan hospitals in the Monthly Financial Survey (MFS). The MHA encourages hospital staff to participate in a webinar at 10 a.m. Oct. 26 to learn more about the benefits of the MFS and the data submission process.

The MFS is an online financial and utilization benchmarking tool that is available to hospitals free of charge and collects key data elements from current hospital operations. Approximately 500 hospitals in 14 states participate; some Michigan hospitals having participated in the MFS program since 1999. In addition to providing timely data to the MHA for representing and advocating for the interests of its member hospitals, the MFS program provides data that are useful to participating hospitals. Major benefits of the MFS program are timeliness,

completeness, simplicity and uniformity of data.
